Title Within And Between Batch Correction Of LC-MS Metabolomics Data

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Description From the perspective of metabolites as the continuation of the central dogma of biology, metabolomics provides the closest link to many phenotypes of interest. This makes metabolomics research promising in teasing apart the complexities of living systems. However, due to experimental reasons, the data includes non-biological variation which limits quality and reproducibility, especially if the data is obtained from several batches. The batchCorr package reduces unwanted variation by way of between-batch alignment, within-batch drift correction and between-batch normalization using batch-specific quality control samples and long-term reference QC samples. Please see the associated article for more thorough descriptions of algorithms.

Details

A basic method with matrices (samples as rows) and SummarizedExperiment is supported. For grouping variables such as batches, the basic method expects vectors, while the SummarizedExperiment method expects the names of the respective columns in PeakTabFilled. The basic method returns a list with the aligned peak table and information about the process, whereas the SummarizedExperiment method assigns the aligned peak table to the object supplied to PeakTabFilled.

Value

a SummarizedExperiment object as PeakTabFill with the aligned matrix or a list of six:

- PTalign: the aligned peak table
- boolAveragedAlign: boolean vector of final features where alignment has been made using feature averaging
- PTfill: peaktable without missing values (indata)
- boolKeep: boolean vector of features kept after alignment
- boolAveragedFill boolean vector of original features where alignment has been made using feature averaging
- AI: alignIndex object (indata)

Value

A SummarizedExperiment object with the corrected and filtered matrix or a list, including the corrected and filtered matrix as well as processing information:

- actionInfo: see what happened to each cluster
- TestFeatsCorr: to extract drift-corrected data
- TestFeatsFinal: to extract drift-corrected data which pass the criterion QC CV < CVlimit

*Merge batches after drift correction***Description**

The output of the within-batch drift correction is a correction object. This function merges peak tables from several batches by extracting information from the correction objects. The user must specify a minimum proportion of qualified batches per feature, i.e. such batches where the QC CV is < the specified limit. There is thus a risk that features with poor quality (in certain batches) are present, but the features are present in high quality in sufficient proportion of batches to anyway warrant inclusion.
